**GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE TO
THE REPORT AND
RECOMMENDATION OF THE
MAGISTRATE JUDGE**

FILED UNDER SEAL

Chief United States Magistrate Judge Mary Alice Theiler has issued a Report and Recommendation in this matter recommending that the search warrant paperwork be unsealed. Judge Theiler also recommends that the suspects' names be redacted to protect their privacy.

Other than the scope of the redactions recommended by Judge Theiler, the government is not objecting to the Report and Recommendation. To protect the privacy of suspects and others involved in the investigation, the government recommends that in addition to redacting the names, the Court redact other information in the search warrant materials which – either on its own or in conjunction with publically available information – might disclose identities. In addition, the government recommends that the Court redact identifiable photographs of the suspects that are contained in Attachment C

1 to the Affidavit of Special Agent Geoffrey Maron.

2 The government is submitting *ex parte* and under seal a set of the search warrant
3 materials which include all of the proposed redactions.





5 I, Geoffrey Maron, being first duly sworn, depose and state as follows:

6
7 **Affiant's Background**

8 1. I have been a Special Agent ("SA") of the Federal Bureau of Investigation
9 ("FBI") since 2003. I am trained and experienced in investigating a wide variety of
10 violations of federal criminal law. I am currently assigned to the FBI's Seattle office, and
11 work on the Joint Terrorism Task Force ("JTTF"). My information is based on my direct
12 knowledge and information provided by other law enforcement sources. This affidavit
13 does not include everything that I have learned during the investigation, but rather only
14 includes enough information to show probable cause.

15 2. I make this affidavit in support of an application under Rule 41 of the
16 Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure for a warrant to search cellular phones and digital
17 media storage devices (collectively, the "SUBJECT DEVICES") as more fully described
18 in Attachment A to this Affidavit, for the items described in Attachment B to this
19 Affidavit. All of the SUBJECT DEVICES are now located in the Western District of
20 Washington.

21 3. As set forth below, there is probable cause to believe that a search of
22 subject devices described above will provide evidence, instrumentalities, or fruits of
23 violations of the following offenses: Destruction of government property, in violation of
24 18 U.S.C. § 1361; Conspiracy to destroy government property, in violation of 18 U.S.C. §
25 371; Interstate travel with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2101; and Conspiracy
26 to travel interstate with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 371.

27 **The Investigation**

28 4. I am investigating the "May Day" rioting and vandalism in Seattle on May

1 1, 2012, which included the vandalism and destruction of United States Government
2 property at the William Kenzo Nakamura United States Courthouse, 1010 Fifth Avenue,
3 Seattle, Washington (the "Nakamura Courthouse"). I have obtained information from
4 Donna Sweeney of the United States General Services Administration ("GSA"). The
5 GSA is a federal agency that acts as the landlord for federal government property. The
6 GSA is responsible for managing and maintaining federal buildings. Ms. Sweeney is the
7 GSA property manager, and is responsible for managing GSA properties to include the
8 Nakamura Courthouse. According to Ms. Sweeney, the Nakamura Courthouse is, and has
9 always been, federal property owned by the United States Government.

10 5. The Courthouse is clearly marked as a federal Government building. The
11 following appears directly over the doors, in very large letters:

12 WILLIAM KENZO NAKAMURA
13 UNITED STATES COURT HOUSE
14 U.S. COURT OF APPEALS

15 6. The investigation has identified several suspects in the vandalism of the
16 Courthouse and the May Day rioting. Several of these suspects are Oregon residents who
17 traveled to Seattle for May Day. Some or all of these suspects appear to be anarchists.
18 As defined by Wikipedia, "Anarchism is generally defined as the political philosophy
19 which holds the state to be immoral, or alternatively as opposing authority in the conduct
20 of human relations. Proponents of anarchism (known as 'anarchists') advocate stateless
21 societies based on non hierarchical voluntary associations." Although many anarchists
22 are law-abiding, there is a history in the Pacific Northwest of some anarchists
23 participating in property destruction and other criminal activity in support of their
24 political philosophy.

25 **Overview Of The May 1, 2012, "May Day" Riots**

26 7. May 1st, or "May Day," is historically a day of protest. As explained in
27 Tides of Flame, "a Seattle Anarchist Paper," in an article titled "Why May Day? Why the
28 General Strike?": "Every year millions of people around the world celebrate May 1st as a

1 dignified day of revolt against this system." In this article, the writers "urge everyone to
2 skip out on school and work to take to the streets." Additionally, associated with the
3 article, a published schedule for May Day 2012 included the text:

4
5 9AM: Breakfast & Worker Speakout
6 11AM 4PM: Rise & Decolonize 2
7 Hip Hop Occupies and Speakers
8 12PM: Anti Capitalist March
9 3PM: "Honor the Dead, Fight for the Living"
10 March Against Police and Racist Violence
11 5PM: March for Immigrant and Workers' Rights
12 *from Judkins Park
13 6PM: Rally
14 7PM: General Assembly
15 Blockades and direct actions ongoing all day.

16
17 8. Because suspected anarchists have rioted and destroyed property at other
18 recent demonstrations, and based on the call for "direct actions," I and other officers were
19 responsible for preventing and responding to criminal activity on May 1, 2012. As
20 advertised, on May 1, 2012, there were a variety of events that took place in downtown
21 Seattle. Most of these events were in the vicinity of Westlake Park, located at 401 Pine
22 Street in Seattle. People began gathering at Westlake Park at approximately 7:00 a.m.

23 9. By approximately 12:20 p.m., approximately 500 to 1,000 people had
24 amassed in and near Westlake Park. Within the larger group, a sub group changed into
25 "black bloc" clothing. Black bloc is a tactic whereby individuals wear black clothing and
26 items such as scarves or motorcycle helmets to cover their faces, allowing them to
27 conceal their identity and appear as a unified mass. The black bloc tactics can be used
28 both offensively and defensively. Offensive use of black bloc includes illegal activities

1 such as demonstrating without a permit, rioting, vandalism and property destruction
2 (usually of symbolic targets such as banks), and assault. Defensive use of black bloc
3 includes illegal activities such as obstruction of arrests.

4 10. The black bloc rioters on May Day targeted banks, a federal government
5 building, retail outlets of large corporations and members of the media. Many carried
6 large sticks which served as flag poles. Many of the sticks had screws placed at the base,
7 which would help with breaking windows. Most of the sticks were solid wood at least
8 one inch thick and approximately three feet long. These sticks were used on May Day to
9 damage property and assault (or attempt to assault) people.

10 11. A group of about 50 people (including known anarchists from the Seattle
11 area, Olympia and Portland, Oregon) changed into the black bloc uniform at Westlake
12 and formed the May Day black bloc group (the "black bloc rioters" or the "rioters"). Law
13 enforcement did not see the suspects identified so far in this investigation as they changed
14 into black bloc. The black bloc rioters marched within the larger group of marchers from
15 Westlake Park into the downtown business district. The marchers moved west on Pike
16 Street, a one way street for eastbound traffic, blocking both vehicular and pedestrian
17 traffic. The marchers then turned south onto 3rd Ave where a videographer from a local
18 news stations was attacked. A rioter hit the videographer in the face with a flag pole
19 stick, injuring his face.

20 12. The marchers continued south on 3rd Avenue to Union Street where the
21 black bloc rioters surrounded a vehicle that was forced to stop in the intersection. These
22 rioters blocked the car's path, hit and climbed on the car, and waved signs at the
23 occupants.

24 13. The marchers continued south on 3rd Avenue, and then turned east on
25 Seneca Street, which is a one way street westbound, again blocking traffic. Rioters
26 attacked the Wells Fargo bank branch at the northwest corner of 4th Avenue and Seneca
27 Street. Rioters broke windows and threw paint projectiles at the building. Bank
28 employees tried to summon help by setting off robbery alarms, but the police response

1 was delayed by the congestion created by the unpermitted march.

2 14. After attacking the Wells Fargo bank branch, the marchers eventually
3 reached the Nakamura Courthouse located in the 1000 block of 6th Avenue. As
4 discussed in more detail below, acting in a coordinated way, roughly twelve black bloc
5 rioters attacked the Courthouse. The vandalism included spray painting, paint projectiles,
6 breaking windows and doorpanes, and throwing an incendiary device. The damages from
7 the attack ran into the tens of thousands of dollars.

8 15. After vandalizing the Courthouse, the marchers proceeded north on 6th
9 Avenue, spray painting vehicles with the anarchist "A" symbol, breaking windows and
10 flattening tires. Rioters attacked the Nike store at the northwest corner of 6th Avenue and
11 Pike Street by throwing rocks, paint projectiles and incendiary devices and breaking
12 windows. Video shows the rioters moving in a coordinated way, with a wave of rioters
13 striking windows, and then falling back to be replaced by another wave. The police
14 response after the attack of the Nike store prompted the rioters to scatter. The rioters
15 headed back to Westlake Park and/or scattered, changing out of their black bloc clothing.

16 16. Many other acts of vandalism and property destruction were committed
17 during the riot.

18 **Overview Of Identification Of Suspects In The Vandalism Of The Nakamura**
19 **Courthouse**

20 17. As discussed above, the black bloc rioters vandalized the Nakamura
21 Courthouse. I have seen video of the vandalism of the Nakamura Courthouse that was
22 taken by a local television station, video taken by the security cameras on the Nakamura
23 Courthouse, and photographs taken by individuals. The main target of the attack was the
24 entrance to the Courthouse on 6th Avenue side, which is made up of three double glass
25 doors. The videos and photos show that roughly twelve people in black bloc vandalized
26 the 6th Avenue doors. The vandalism was clearly coordinated: a wave of vandals would
27 run up to the doors, batter them, and retire, followed by another wave. Two other black
28 bloc rioters -- one north of the entrance, and one south -- threw objects at the Courthouse.

1 Following the concentrated attack by the black bloc rioters, two other people, "C.W." and
2 "C.I.," emerged from the crowd and battered the Courthouse with flag poles. C.W. and
3 C.I. do not appear to have been part of the organized anarchist group. Finally, somebody
4 threw an object that burned like a road flare at the Courthouse. The object landed on the
5 steps, where it burned and poured out smoke. Paint of various colors (green, red, black,
6 grey, and blue/purple) were used in paint bombs, signs, and graffiti during the attack on
7 the courthouse

8 18. My investigation has identified several of the suspected Nakamura
9 Courthouse vandals, including five Oregon residents, namely [REDACTED],
10 [REDACTED],
11 six person, [REDACTED], is suspected of conspiring with the vandals, and may have
12 vandalized property herself. I will refer collectively to these six suspects as the "Oregon
13 conspirators." As discussed below in more detail, the following evidence establishes
14 probable cause to believe that these people vandalized, and/or conspired to vandalize, the
15 Courthouse.

16 Identification Of The Oregon Conspirators

17 19. As discussed below in more detail, the following evidence establishes the
18 involvement of the Oregon conspirators:

19 a. The Oregon conspirators are all known anarchists according to
20 Portland area law enforcement;

21 b. Surveillance and recovered text messages show that Portland
22 anarchist, [REDACTED] traveled with some or all of the other Oregon Conspirators to
23 Seattle. Recovered text messages apparently sent after the demonstrations and riots show
24 [REDACTED] confirming that "everyone" was "safe" and stating that the day was "awesome;"

25 c. I and other law enforcement officers have carefully analyzed hours
26 of video and hundreds of still images from the May Day riots. I have compared the
27 features and clothing of the masked vandals as they commit their crimes with the features
28 and clothing of the Oregon conspirators in images where the conspirators are unmasked.

1 Critical and distinctive features and clothing match, allowing me to identify particular
2 masked vandals as the Oregon Conspirators;

3 d. Some of the distinctive clothing mentioned above was recovered
4 during a Portland Police Bureau search of a Portland address associated with several of
5 the Oregon conspirators on May 3, 2012; and

6 e. Some of the distinctive clothing mentioned above was recovered
7 during the FBI searches of Portland locations associated with the Oregon conspirators on
8 July 25, 2012.

9 Each basis for probable cause is discussed in more detail below.

10 **The Oregon Conspirators Are Known Anarchists**

11 20. I have been in contact with Portland area law enforcement officers, who
12 have reported that the Oregon conspirators are known members of the Portland anarchist
13 community. For example, [REDACTED]

14 [REDACTED], as well as other acts of vandalism which are believed to be motivated
15 by anarchist beliefs. Portland Police Bureau Sergeant Dobson, who has had multiple
16 encounters with [REDACTED] over the past several years, reported that he has known
17 [REDACTED] to be affiliated with anarchists since 2005.

18 21. [REDACTED] have been spotted by law
19 enforcement at Portland addresses known to be "squats" where anarchists congregate.
20 (Anarchists or groups of anarchists commonly occupy or "squat" in homes that have been
21 abandoned, foreclosed, or left vacant. Squatting is a communal activity that is part of the
22 anarchist culture. Anarchists will often maintain several squats at once and bounce back
23 and forth between them.) Furthermore, [REDACTED] and others
24 were all observed by FBI surveillance at an event on April 9, 2012, during which they
25 changed from street clothes into black bloc attire.

26 **The Oregon Conspirators Traveled As A Group To Seattle For May Day**

27 22. Several of the Oregon Conspirators ([REDACTED])
28 [REDACTED], along with others, were observed by FBI surveillance as they traveled in a

1 rented Zip car [REDACTED] from
2 Portland to Olympia on April 30, 2012, and went to residences of known anarchists
3 (although the FBI does not know with whom they met). The Conspirators spent the night
4 in Olympia. Surveillance was not in place on the morning of May 1st when the
5 Conspirators left for Seattle, and did not actually see them drive to Seattle. However, as
6 shown below, text messages and other information show that this group of Conspirators
7 reached Seattle and participated in May Day. According to Zip car records, the Zip car
8 was rented by [REDACTED] and the mileage traveled was consistent with a roundtrip from
9 Portland to Seattle.

10 23. Recovered text messages show that the Portland conspirators traveled to
11 Seattle for the purpose of participating in May Day. On May 3, 2012, law enforcement
12 searched a home at [REDACTED] as part of an investigation
13 into [REDACTED] alleged vandalism of an ATM. During that search, officers seized a cell
14 phone which appears to belong to [REDACTED] based on: (1) the fact that [REDACTED]
15 claimed that address as her residence; (2) [REDACTED] was in the house when it was searched
16 at 8:00 a.m. in the morning; and (3) somebody sent the user of the phone a text referring
17 to the user as [REDACTED]. The text messages show that [REDACTED] and others were
18 planning for May Day as early as April 27, 2012.

19 a. On April 27, 2012, [REDACTED] -- apparently [REDACTED] -- sent a
20 text stating: "Hey y'all! I booked a zipcar for Seattle. If we fill the van its \$24/ person
21 roundtrip. Leaving pdx at 5 pm Monday and leaving Seattle by midnight Tuesday night.
22 let me know asap if yer in. :)." [REDACTED] responded, ""Sounds great."

23 b. On April 29, 2012, [REDACTED] had a text message conversation with
24 [REDACTED] stated: "Hey [REDACTED] This is [REDACTED] I was thinking a lot about your
25 reasoning for going to seattle for may day. I thought things would be much more effective
26 up there as well. I have an opportunity to get up there and back and wanted to know if i
27 could meet up with you guys for the demo. Let me know. Thanks." [REDACTED] responded:
28 "Hey [REDACTED] Glad to hear you can go. We can meet up at westlake and all be in a loose

1 | *portland bloc*. I am assuming you will have a protest buddy or something tho, because
2 | things may be hectic. Im not very well informed about what is going on and will be
3 | relying on others for info that day" (emphasis added).

4 | c. On April 29, 2012, [REDACTED] had a text message conversation with
5 | [REDACTED] [REDACTED] asked if there was anything that he could do before they left. [REDACTED]
6 | responded: "I only cut the shirt in half becuse its not big enough. If you can figure out
7 | two slightly small bandanas out of it, thatd be great." From my training and experience, I
8 | know that bandanas are standard face covering as part of black bloc attire.

9 | d. On May 1, 2012 -- apparently after the riots -- [REDACTED] had a text
10 | message conversation with [REDACTED] [REDACTED] asked, "Is everyone safe?" [REDACTED]
11 | responded, "Yes. We are all ok. It was awesome. Sorry you had to work."

12 | e. On May 2, 2012, [REDACTED] had a text message conversation with
13 | [REDACTED] [REDACTED] asked, "How are you doing? Everything ok?" [REDACTED]
14 | responded: "Yeah made it back to portland safely. It was great participating in seattle and
15 | seeing my friends. Thanks for the encouragement. You guys all safe?"

16 | **Identification Of Oregon Conspirators Through Analysis Of Images**

17 | 24. I have reviewed hours of video footage and hundreds of still images from
18 | the May Day riots and the vandalism of the Nakamura Courthouse. As an FBI agent, I
19 | have extensive training and experience in making observations and identifying people and
20 | objects. That training and experience, combined with painstaking review of the May Day
21 | images, has helped me to identify five of the Oregon Conspirators as suspects in the
22 | actual vandalism of the Nakamura Courthouse. Working in conjunction with other
23 | officers, I was able to identify and track individuals by their physical characteristics,
24 | clothing items, backpacks, flags, position in the crowd, companions and movements. My
25 | identifications are based on the specifics given below, as well as on my general sense of a
26 | person's height, build, and other features that were gained during his numerous hours of
27 | image review, and is hard to translate into words and specifics.

1 Identification Of Subject 1 As [REDACTED]

2 25. The images show a masked black bloc vandal referred to as "Subject 1"
3 attacking the left set of the Courthouse doors with a flag pole. I identified Subject 1 as
4 [REDACTED]. I identified [REDACTED] by comparing clothing he wore during
5 the attack (while masked) with clothing worn by [REDACTED] in images where he is
6 unmasked, and by matching other physical characteristics.

7 *Images show Subject 1 marching with people identified as other Oregon*
8 *conspirators.*

9 26. Images show Subject 1, in black bloc, marching with other black bloc
10 anarchists who appear to be [REDACTED], and the person believed to be
11 [REDACTED]

12 *Both Subject 1 and [REDACTED] are left handed.*

13 27. Images show Subject 1 hitting the door with a left handed strike. A still
14 photo from May Day shows a black bloc vandal who appears to be Subject 1 just after he
15 has used his left hand to throw an object at a Wells Fargo bank branch. According to
16 Portland Police Bureau Sergeant Dobson and Detective McDaniel, both who are familiar
17 with [REDACTED], [REDACTED] is left handed.

18 *Clothing worn by Subject 1 matches [REDACTED] clothing.*

19 28. Images show Subject 1 wearing the following clothing: (a) brown/green
20 colored mid-top to high-top shoes; (b) a strip of white at the waist consistent with a white
21 belt; and (c) the fringe of a shirt with a blue hue.

22 29. These items of clothing worn by Subject 1 have been matched to [REDACTED]
23 in various ways. A photo taken by the media during an October 16, 2011, protest shows
24 [REDACTED] with his face partly covered, wearing shoes that appear to be the same shoes
25 worn by Subject 1. I identified the man in that October 16, 2011, photo as [REDACTED] by
26 comparing the photo with [REDACTED]'s Oregon driver's license photo.

27 30. Furthermore, when officers searched [REDACTED]
28

1 [REDACTED] on May 3, 2012, as part of an investigation into [REDACTED]'s alleged vandalism
2 of an ATM, they photographed shoes matching the shoes worn by Subject 1. A white belt
3 consistent with the white strip seen on Subject 1 was also seized during this search. The
4 [REDACTED] address was a "squat" used by [REDACTED] and other
5 anarchists.

6 31. On July 25, 2012, the FBI searched a storage unit at [REDACTED]
7 [REDACTED] pursuant to a search warrant. During the search, agents
8 found shoes which appear to be the same shoes as those worn by Subject 1, which were
9 located in a box addressed to [REDACTED]

10 32. An image from May Day shows a person I recognize as [REDACTED]
11 unmasked, standing next to a person who appears to be [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] is wearing a
12 blue/purple hued shirt that appears similar to the fringe of what appears to be a blue shirt
13 worn by Subject 1. During the FBI search of the storage unit [REDACTED] agents found a
14 blue/purple hued shirt which appears to be the above described shirt. The pattern of lines
15 on the shirt appears identical to the shirt worn by [REDACTED] on May Day.

16 33. Furthermore, I noted that Subject 1's height appears consistent with the
17 height of 6'2 listed for [REDACTED] on his driver's license. Subject 1's build appears
18 consistent with [REDACTED]'s build as shown in unmasked images of [REDACTED].

19 Identification Of Subject 2 As [REDACTED]

20 34. A video shows Subject 2, a masked black bloc vandal, throwing an object at
21 the Nakamura Courthouse doors. I have identified Subject 2 as [REDACTED]

22 *Both Subject 2 and [REDACTED] are very short*

23 35. From the video of the Nakamura vandalism, and from other images of
24 Subject 2 from May Day, it is clear that Subject 2 is short -- shorter than any other black
25 bloc vandal that I have seen during my extensive review of the images. According to a
26 Portland Police Bureau report, [REDACTED] is 4'11.

27 *Images show Subject 2 marching with other Oregon Conspirators*

28 36. Images from May Day show Subject 2 marching with masked black bloc

1 | anarchists that I have identified as [REDACTED].

2 | Subject 2's clothing matches clothing known to be worn by [REDACTED]

3 | 37. Images from the attack on the Nakamura Courthouse show the masked
4 | Subject 2 wearing nylon shell-type pants and a backpack. I have seen images of [REDACTED]
5 | unmasked, at an event on April 9, 2012, where she is wearing what appear to be the same
6 | or very similar nylon shell-type pants, as well as a backpack that looks similar to Subject
7 | 2's backpack. I identified [REDACTED] as the woman in the April 9th photo by comparing it with
8 | her Oregon identification card photo.

9 | 38. Images from the attack on the Nakamura Courthouse show the masked
10 | Subject 2 wearing black/brown boots with distinctive shape and stitching which are
11 | visible in numerous other Images on May Day. Shoes which appear identical to the shoes
12 | worn by Subject 2 were recovered during the July 25, 2012 search of [REDACTED]
13 | [REDACTED] in a room with many indicators of it being [REDACTED]'s room.

14 | Identification Of Subject 3 As [REDACTED]

15 | 39. Images from the Nakamura Courthouse attack show a masked black bloc
16 | vandal referred to as Subject 3 throwing an object at the middle set of Courthouse doors.
17 | I have identified Subject 3 as [REDACTED]

18 | *Images show Subject 3 marching with other Oregon Conspirators*

19 | 40. Images from May Day show Subject 3 marching with masked black bloc
20 | anarchists identified by me as [REDACTED] and the person believed to be
21 | [REDACTED].

22 | *Clothing worn by Subject 3 matches clothing worn by [REDACTED]*

23 | 41. Images show the masked Subject 3 wearing a fanny pack with a white
24 | insignia and a black jacket with a white insignia. I have seen images of [REDACTED]
25 | unmasked, at an event on April 9, 2012, wearing what appears to be the same black jacket
26 | with white insignia and same fanny pack with white insignia worn by Subject 3.

27 | 42. I identified the unmasked images of [REDACTED] by comparing them with
28 | [REDACTED]'s Oregon driver's license photo. The jacket and fanny pack were recovered

1 during the search of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] was present in the house at
2 the time of the search, and law enforcement regularly saw his car parked at the house.

3 Identification Of Subject 4 As [REDACTED]

4 43. Video from the Nakamura attack shows a masked black bloc vandal,
5 referred to as Subject 4, throwing an object at a window north of the Courthouse doors.
6 When Subject 4 throws the object, somebody seems to call Subject 4 a "bitch," suggesting
7 that Subject 4 is a woman. I have identified Subject 4 as [REDACTED] Images of the
8 attack show the masked Subject 4 wearing a black single strap tear shaped backpack and
9 wearing tight pants, white socks or no socks, and black shoes. Another image from May
10 Day shows a woman who appears to be [REDACTED], unmasked, with her face turned away
11 from the camera, standing next to [REDACTED]. I compared that photograph to known
12 photographs of [REDACTED] and based on the visible facial features, hair, and glasses, it
13 appears to be [REDACTED]. In that unmasked image, [REDACTED] is wearing a tear-shaped
14 backpack that matches the backpack worn by Subject 4.

15 44. Another image from May Day shows Subject 4, masked, walking next to
16 masked people identified as [REDACTED] and the person believed to be
17 [REDACTED]. Subject 4's glasses are visible, and they match glasses worn by [REDACTED] in
18 known, unmasked images of [REDACTED]. The tear shaped backpack was recovered by the
19 Portland Police Bureau during the search of [REDACTED] [REDACTED] may
20 have borrowed the bag from [REDACTED] who lived at that address and had been seen with
21 that backpack on April 9, 2012.

22 Evidence Indicating Subject 5 is [REDACTED]

23 45. Video and images from the Nakamura attack shows a masked black bloc
24 vandal, referred to as Subject 5, throwing an object which appears to be a rock at the
25 middle set of doors of Courthouse doors.

26 *Images show Subject 5 marching with other Oregon Conspirators*

27 46. Images from May Day show Subject 5 marching with masked black bloc
28 anarchists identified by me as [REDACTED] [REDACTED] is a known

1 anarchist and an associate of [REDACTED]

2 *Shoes worn by Subject 5 match shoes associated with [REDACTED]*

3 47. Images show Subject 5 wearing boots of a distinctive shape, bearing
4 distinctive markings and shoelaces of distinctive color. Shoes which appear identical to
5 the shoes worn by Subject 5 were recovered during the July 25, 2012, search of storage
6 [REDACTED]. Court papers and other documents
7 addressed to [REDACTED] were also located during the search of the storage unit [REDACTED]
8 Furthermore, [REDACTED] actually showed up at the storage unit shortly before it was
9 searched. On July 25, 2012, the FBI conducted overt surveillance of storage [REDACTED]
10 prior to a warrant being obtained to search the unit. At approximately 11:50 a.m.,
11 [REDACTED] arrived at the storage unit, saw the agents, and suggested that they go someplace
12 else. [REDACTED] told one agent that he didn't like the agent's FBI shirt, and also
13 complained that the agents were armed.

14 Slides of Select Images (Attachment C)

15 48. Some of the images described above are included in a set of eight slides
16 marked as Attachment C to this Affidavit, attached hereto and incorporated by reference
17 herein. The slides (which are attached both on a CD and in a printed hardcopy) show the
18 following:

19 a. Slide 1 - Slide 1 contains a video of the event entitled "Seattle May Day
20 violence, May 1, 2012. #seamayday" available on youtube.

21 b. Slide 2 - Slide 2 depicts some of the damage done to the Courthouse,
22 anarchist graffiti, an anarchist flag left at the Courthouse, and images of the vandals
23 believed to be [REDACTED], the person believed to be [REDACTED] and
24 [REDACTED] in the act or immediately after the act of damaging the Courthouse.

25 c. Slide 3 - Slide 3 depicts images of [REDACTED] in which his face and hair
26 are visible, one of which was taken on May Day. In the images, the shoes [REDACTED]
27 wears while attacking the courthouse are visible. [REDACTED] is also depicted taking part
28 in a public event on April 9, 2012, in which he, [REDACTED] were

1 observed changing into black bloc attire. Items recovered in the July 25, 2012, searches
2 conducted by the FBI are indicated on the slide and include the shoes and shirt [REDACTED]
3 was wearing on May Day and the hat and pants [REDACTED] was wearing on April 9, 2012.

4 d. Slide 4 - Slide 4 depicts images of [REDACTED] marching in black bloc
5 during May Day with [REDACTED] and the person believed to be [REDACTED]. In
6 the images, [REDACTED] is wearing the shoes depicted in Slide 3 which he wears while
7 attacking the courthouse that have been recovered by the FBI.

8 e. Slide 5 - Slide 5 depicts images of [REDACTED] in which her face is visible
9 while participating in the April 9, 2012, event in which she, [REDACTED] and
10 [REDACTED] were observed changing into black bloc attire. [REDACTED] is depicted marching in
11 black bloc with [REDACTED] and the person believed to be [REDACTED] on
12 May Day. In the images, it is apparent that [REDACTED] is significantly shorter than [REDACTED].
13 [REDACTED]. The images from May Day and those taken on April 9, 2012,
14 show [REDACTED] wearing the same or similar nylon type pants. The shoes recovered in [REDACTED]
15 room during the July 25, 2012, search conducted by the FBI are indicated on the slide.

16 f. Slide 6 - Slide 6 depicts images of [REDACTED] in which his face is visible
17 while participating in the April 9, 2012, event in which he, [REDACTED]
18 were observed changing into black bloc attire. [REDACTED] is depicted in images from May
19 Day where he, in black bloc, marches with [REDACTED] and the person
20 believed to be [REDACTED]. In the images, [REDACTED] is wearing the clothing which he wears
21 while vandalizing the Courthouse. An image on Slide 6 also depicts [REDACTED] in the
22 process of picking up a rock near the Wells Fargo bank which was vandalized as
23 described above. Slide 6 depicts those items that were recovered by the Portland Police
24 Bureau during their May 3, 2012, search of [REDACTED] which include
25 the fanny pack and jacket being worn by [REDACTED] while vandalizing the courthouse.

26 g. Slide 7 - Slide 7 depicts images of [REDACTED] in which her face is visible,
27 wearing glasses which can be identified on [REDACTED] in images of her in black bloc on
28 May Day. [REDACTED] is depicted marching in black bloc in May Day when she was

1 marching with [REDACTED] and the person believed to be [REDACTED]. Her
2 pants, shoes and tear shaped backpack depicted on Slide 7 are visible in the video of her
3 running away after breaking a window at the courthouse in Slide 1. The slide depicts as
4 recovered a backpack which appears identical to the backpack being worn by [REDACTED]
5 which was recovered by the Portland Police Bureau during their May 3, 2012 search of
6 [REDACTED].

7 h. Slide 8 - Slide 8 depicts images of the vandal believed to be [REDACTED].
8 The slide depicts the vandal believed to be [REDACTED] in the act of throwing what appears
9 to be a rock at the middle set of courthouse doors. Also depicted are the shoes visible on
10 the vandal believed to be [REDACTED] during the attack and shoes recovered during the July
11 25, 2012, search of storage [REDACTED] which, as described above, contained items
12 belonging to [REDACTED].

13 The Seizure Of The SUBJECT DEVICES

14 49. I am seeking authority to search cell phones and electronic storage devices
15 (collectively, the "SUBJECT DEVICES") seized during the execution of search warrants
16 on at various Portland, Oregon, locations on July 25, 2012.

17 50. The searches of the relevant locations and the seizures of the SUBJECT
18 DEVICES are discussed below.

19 The Search of [REDACTED]

20 51. The investigation leading up to July 25, 2012, revealed that a residence at
21 [REDACTED] was a squat apparently used by the
22 vandals, including [REDACTED]. According to the Portland Police Bureau, the
23 [REDACTED] and the water has been in her name
24 since April 12, 2012. On July 5, 2012, FBI surveillance located [REDACTED] four-door red
25 Plymouth Breeze bearing [REDACTED] parked in the driveway. On July 6,
26 2012, FBI surveillance saw [REDACTED] father's Plymouth (which surveillance has regularly
27 seen [REDACTED] drive) parked in the driveway for the day. Also, [REDACTED] was seen being
28 dropped off at the residence in the early afternoon by the White Astro Van with [REDACTED]

1 [REDACTED]. A short time later, [REDACTED] was observed walking to and entering the
2 residence. [REDACTED] was dressed in all black with a black backpack. FBI surveillance
3 watched the house again on July 16, 2012, and saw both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] at the
4 house.

5 52. Based on this information, the Honorable Dennis J. Hubel, United States
6 Magistrate Judge for the District of Oregon, issued a search warrant for this residence on
7 July 20, 2012.

8 53. The warrant was executed on July 25, 2012, at roughly 6:20 a.m.

9 [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were in the residence. During the search, officers found
10 evidence suggesting that the residents were [REDACTED].

11 Among the many items recovered or photographed were:

- 12 - an electric bill in [REDACTED] name;
- 13 - a travel document in [REDACTED] name;
- 14 - a City of Portland water bill in [REDACTED] name; and
- 15 - bank records in [REDACTED] name.

16 An apparent school-work paper in [REDACTED] name was found, but there were no other
17 indications of residence for [REDACTED]. Based on what I know, and based on the items
18 seized and photographed during the search, it appears that the only residents were
19 [REDACTED] (although there was limited paperwork associated
20 with other people).

21 *Items Seized From [REDACTED]'s Room*

22 54. One room appeared to be used by [REDACTED], based on the presence of paperwork
23 and identification in her name (including court documents, a passport, a driver's license,
24 and tax documents), personal photos of [REDACTED], newspaper articles mentioning [REDACTED], and
25 [REDACTED]'s wallet. In that room, officers found the following SUBJECT DEVICES:

- 26 - a Nokia T-Mobile cell phone, [REDACTED];
- 27 - an Audiovox cell phone, [REDACTED], located in [REDACTED] room;
- 28 - a Fujifilm 1GB XD card (a camera photo storage card), located in [REDACTED]

1 room; and

2 - an I-Pod with an unreadable serial number.

3 *Items Seized From [REDACTED]'s Room*

4 55. Another room appeared to be used by [REDACTED], based on the presence of
5 paperwork in her name, including a utility bill, and a credit card bill. A note from
6 [REDACTED] to [REDACTED] was in the room, and it is possible that [REDACTED], who is believed
7 to be [REDACTED]'s boyfriend, also spent time in the room. In that room, officers seized the
8 following SUBJECT DEVICES:

- 9 - an I-Pod with an unreadable serial number;
10 - a Motorola cell phone, [REDACTED];
11 - a maroon Blackberry phone [REDACTED]
12 - two CD-Roms and DVD Roms; and
13 - a Digital SLR Nikon camera with media card, #3200377.

14 *Items Seized From [REDACTED]'s Room*

15 56. Officers searched a room that appeared to be [REDACTED], based on the
16 presence of paperwork and identification in his name, including a copy of a passport,
17 checks, bills, and a package addressed to [REDACTED]. In the room, officers found the
18 following SUBJECT DEVICES:

- 19 - a Samsung cellular phone s.n: [REDACTED]
20 - a PNY 16GB black USB thumbdrive; and
21 - a Kingston 2 GB Micro SD card (a memory and storage device commonly
22 used in a cell phone).

23 *Search Of Common Area*

24 57. During the search of a common area that appeared to serve as a living room,
25 officers found eight CD-Roms and DVD-Roms, and a Duotone LTD thumbdrive. When
26 the search warrant was executed, at roughly 6:20 a.m., only [REDACTED] were
27 in the home. As described above, it appears that the only residents of the home were
28 [REDACTED], and paperwork and other items associated with

1 [REDACTED] were found in the common area, including bills in [REDACTED] s
2 name, a notebook and court paperwork for [REDACTED], relocation paperwork for [REDACTED], a
3 receipt in [REDACTED] s name, mail from health center to [REDACTED], a banjo in a case with a receipt in
4 [REDACTED] s name, and personal pictures of [REDACTED]

5 The Search Of [REDACTED]

6 58. The investigation led agents to believe that a residence at [REDACTED]
7 [REDACTED], was a squat used by [REDACTED], and possibly others.

8 59. Magistrate Judge Hubel also issued a search warrant for this location on
9 July 20, 2012. The warrant was executed on July 25, 2012 at roughly 6:35 a.m.

10 [REDACTED] was home at the time of the search. Officers found evidence of
11 [REDACTED] s residence in the home, such as a travel document in [REDACTED] name, a receipt
12 from BumpMyLock.com in [REDACTED] name, and a handwritten document with the word
13 [REDACTED]. It appeared that [REDACTED] was the only person living in the residence, as no
14 indicia of occupancy were found for anybody other than [REDACTED].

15 60. During the search the officers found the following SUBJECT DEVICES:

- 16 - a Sandisk thumb drive;
17 - a Red thumb drive; and
18 - a T-Mobile cell phone HTC G-2.

19 The Search Of The Storage Unit

20 61. As discussed in Paragraph 47, on July 25, 2012, agents searched a storage
21 [REDACTED]. The storage unit was rented in
22 [REDACTED] name. Items associated with [REDACTED] were found
23 in the storage unit, and [REDACTED] actually arrived at the unit before the search. Items
24 associated with another person were also found in the unit. This person is yet another
25 possible suspect in the May Day investigation, as recovered text messages show that this
26 person traveled from Portland to Seattle on May Day and was in contact with one or more
27 of the Conspirators. Agents also found a SUBJECT DEVICE, namely a DVD in the
28 storage unit that was hand labeled "J.R.-1 9/18/11."

Probable Cause With Respect To The Subject Devices

62. The SUBJECT DEVICES fall into the following categories: (1) cell phones, (2) I-Pods, (3) electronic storage media (thumb drives, CD-Roms, and DVD-Roms), (4) a camera and memory cards for a camera.

63. With respect to cell phones, from my training and experience, I know that criminals in general, and criminal anarchists in particular, use cellular telephones to plan and coordinate activities via phone calls, text message, and emails, as well as by accessing the Internet. Criminal conspiracies require communication, and cell phones are the key tool for communication. I have reviewed numerous postings on line at sites in which events are scheduled and coordinating instructions are given. I have seen anarchists at events utilizing cellular telephones, and have seen text messaging used to plan and coordinate anarchist events. Furthermore, I have seen photographs of anarchist "actions" taken with cell phones by participants. For example, evidence of planning and communications for May Day was found on [REDACTED]'s cell phone seized at [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] Address books and contact lists are also fruitful sources of evidence, as they commonly reveal names and other information about others involved in criminal activity and conspiracies. Finally, by obtaining a suspect's cell phone, investigators can determine the suspect's phone number, which can then be used to obtain cell tower information showing where the suspect was when crimes were committed.

64. With respect to the seized cellular phones, I submit that there is probable cause to believe that the following evidence of the crimes will be found:

a. The assigned number to the cellular telephone (known as the mobile directory number or MDN), and the identifying telephone serial number, such as the Electronic Serial Number (ESN), Mobile Identification Number (MIN), International Mobile Subscriber Identity (IMSI), or International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI), reveal the service provider, allow us to obtain subscriber information, and uniquely identify the telephone. This information can be used to obtain toll records, to identify contacts by the telephone with other telephones used by coconspirators, and others

1 involved in the conspiracy, and to identify other telephones used by the same subscriber
2 or purchased as part of a package.

3 b. The stored list of recent received calls and sent calls is important
4 evidence. It identifies telephones recently in contact with the telephone user. This is
5 valuable information because it may help identify telephones used by other members of
6 the conspiracy.

7 c. Stored contact information in the telephone's contact list is important
8 evidence. It can show the user's close associates, and contains names, nicknames, and
9 code names connected to phone numbers that can be used to identify conspirators and to
10 prove communication between conspirators.

11 d. Stored text messages are important evidence, similar to stored
12 numbers. Stored text messages help to identify the user of the phone and the user's
13 associates and conspirators.

14 e. Photographs stored on the telephone are similarly important
15 evidence, because they also help to identify the user of the phone and the user's associates
16 and conspirators, and may also include photographs of past criminal actions or items
17 associated with planned attacks.

18 65. With respect to the seized digital camera and media/storage cards from
19 digital cameras, I know, from my training and experience that evidence relevant to
20 criminal investigations is commonly found on digital cameras and camera storage cards.
21 Photographs stored on the digital cameras and cards from digital cameras may help to
22 identify the owner's associates and conspirators. The digital cameras and media cards
23 from digital cameras may include photographs of past criminal actions or items associated
24 with the vandalism. Photographs may show whether the suspects were wearing clothing
25 associated with the attacks, or whether the suspects were in Seattle at the time of the
26 vandalism.

27 66. With respect to the seized electronic storage devices such as thumbdrives,
28 DVDs, and CDs, I know from my training and experience that a wide variety of evidence

1 may be found on these devices. Data from cell phones, cameras, and other devices can
2 easily be transferred and stored to thumbdrives, DVDs, and CDs. Thus, any evidence that
3 one can expect to find on a cell phone, camera, or other device may also be found stored
4 on thumbdrives, DVDs, and CDs. To cite just a few examples:

5 a. Contact information is often stored in the digital equivalent of a
6 paper list. During the July 25, 2012 search of storage unit [REDACTED]
7 [REDACTED], a printed list of contacts was recovered among [REDACTED] documents.
8 The original of this document or similar documents can be stored on thumbdrives.

9 b. Photographs of evidentiary value can be stored on thumbdrives.

10 c. Digital documents in which evidence of planning, travel, purchases
11 in support of, motivation for, and claims of responsibility for the attack on the Nakamura
12 building can be stored on thumbdrives.

13 67. With respect to the seized I-Pods, I submit that there is probable cause to
14 believe the following evidence of the crimes may be found:

15 a. Contact information can be stored on I-Pods;

16 b. Photographs of evidentiary value can be stored on I-Pods;

17 c. I-Pods can be configured to be used as the equivalent of a
18 thumbdrive for storage of digital documents in which evidence of planning, travel,
19 purchases in support of, motivation for, and claims of responsibility for the attack on the
20 Nakamura building may be found.


21 Conclusion

22 68. Based on the foregoing, I respectfully submit that there is probable cause to
23 believe that the offenses of Destruction of government property, in violation of 18 U.S.C.
24 § 1361; Conspiracy to destroy government property, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 371;
25 Interstate travel with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2101; and Conspiracy to
26 travel interstate with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 371., have been committed,
27 and that there is probable cause to believe that evidence, fruits and instrumentalities of
28 those offenses will be found in the locations to be searched, as described in Attachment

1 A, attached hereto and incorporated herein, namely:

2 a. Photographs, documentation or communications related to the offenses,
3 including but not limited to electronic notes, diagrams, letters, diary and journal entries,
4 receipts, travel records address books, still and video images, evidence suggesting a
5 motive to vandalize government property, and other documentation in electronic form;
6 and

7 b. Evidence of possession of relevant items (such as clothing, backpacks, or
8 other items) or residence at relevant locations (such as locations where other evidence
9 was found).

The items to be seized are the following items or materials that may be evidence of the commission of, the fruits of, or property which has been used as the means of committing federal criminal violations of Destruction of government property, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1361; Conspiracy to destroy government property, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 371; Interstate travel with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2101; and Conspiracy to travel interstate with intent to riot, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 371, namely:

a. Photographs, documentation or communications related to the offenses, including but not limited to electronic notes, diagrams, letters, diary and journal entries, receipts, travel records address books, still and video images, evidence suggesting a motive to vandalize government property, ~~and other documentation in electronic form;~~ and

b. Evidence of possession of relevant items (such as clothing, backpacks, or other items) or residence at relevant locations (such as locations where other evidence was found).

With respect to cellular phones, the scope of the search is limited to:

a. The assigned number to the cellular telephone (known as the mobile directory number or MDN), and the identifying telephone serial number, such as the Electronic Serial Number (ESN), Mobile Identification Number (MIN), International Mobile Subscriber Identity (IMSI), or International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI);

- b. Lists or logs of incoming and outgoing calls;
- c. Contact lists or address books;
- d. Text messages; and
- e. Photographs.

No further search of cellular phones shall be conducted absent court authorization or an exigency as that term is utilized in Fourth Amendment jurisprudence.
